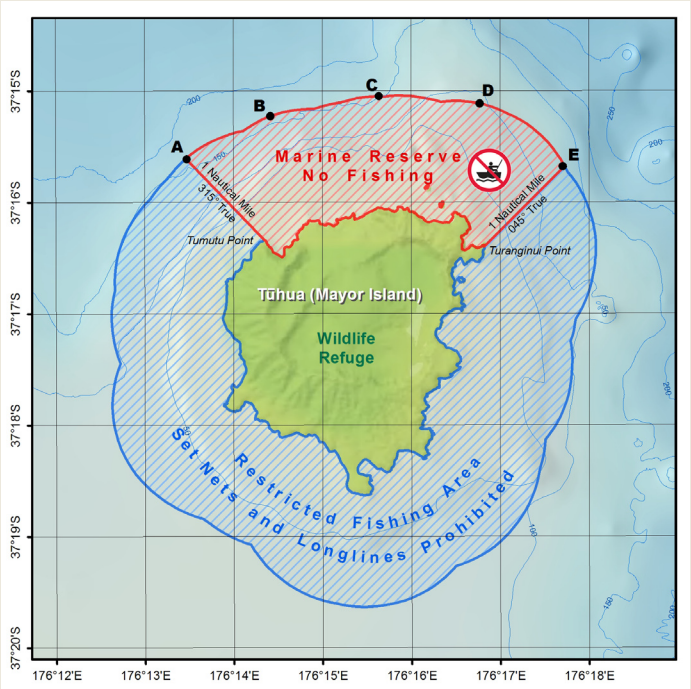




Tūhua (Mayor Island) Marine Reserve

Island refuge

Tūhua / Mayor Island is privately owned and is a predator-free wildlife refuge. Strict quarantine rules apply. Landing is only permitted at Opo / South East Bay when the caretaker is present. Otherwise all landing prohibited.

Marine Reserve boundaries

About 3 square nautical miles across the island's northern coastline is marine reserve, extending from the high tide mark onshore to one nautical mile offshore.

The eastern and western reserve boundaries, Turanginui Point and Tumutu Point, are marked by a pair of yellow triangles on the cliffs. The triangles line up when seen from the boundary.
