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1. Chairperson's report

Poipoa te kakano kia puāwai

Nurture the seed and it will blossom

This, my last report as Chairperson, gives me an opportunity to reflect on not only this year but also my seven years on the Board. It's been a tremendous journey that I feel very fortunate to have taken. In this period there's been massive changes of funding for conservation and DOC, the nationwide development of Predator Free 2050 New Zealand, a global pandemic, and climate change. Whew!!

In regards climate change, the ECHB draft Conservation Management Strategy (CMS) refers to the DOC report "Climate Change in East Coast and Hawke's Bay localized projections to support impact assessments". By 2090 we may see as much as a 15% reduction in annual rainfall, 30 more dry days (<1 mm), an annual temperature increase of 3°C, and up to 40 fewer frost nights in the Kaweka Forest Park. We may also see a small increase in heavy rain days, not unlike those experienced in Napier in November 2020! This will undoubtedly impact on our landscape and on our people. It's something the Board needs to have front of mind.

A major role of the Board is to monitor the CMS and it has been a big disappointment for me that the Hawke's Bay CMS (1994 to 2004) and the East Coast (1998-2008) have not yet been replaced with the promised new version for the combined ECHB region! DOC have not prioritised resource to planning and management but instead have lurched into projects funded from other Ministry buckets such as "tourism", or since 2020, through partnering in "jobs for nature"! It's a precarious situation to have the funding of DOC so uncertain. One of my first Board meetings was with the NZ Conservation Authority (NZCA) around 2015, where it tasked themselves and DOC with finding a better planning model and mooted the idea of having the East Coast help to pilot it! However, it was the Wellington Board that managed to charge ahead with designated planning resources and has a replaced CMS that they can monitor. This wasn't without issues that we are hopeful of learning from! We have come to a full circle as the NZCA in late 2020 confronted DOC with its concerns and DOC has undertaken an urgent review of its statutory management planning process. There is a new CMS approach planned, one that will have greater meaning for iwi and hapu and where DOC can more directly see its value for their own planning purposes!! Each CMS will contribute and work alongside Te Mana o te Taiao - the New Zealand Biodiversity Strategy, that guides the way all of Aotearoa works to protect and restore nature. It promises to be an exciting time ahead and I am encouraged to think that our new Board will finally get to have transparent and visible goals for conservation in our region that it can help to monitor for the public.

I like to interpret DOC's mission, "Papatūānuku thrives", into actions where "no native species goes extinct in our watch"! I write this at a time where the presence of (feral) dogs in conservation areas have caused devastation to kiwi restoration work, and where deer, pigs and goats are inhibiting any sense of biodiversity restoration in Forest Parks! The work we have ahead is challenging, and it is important. In our East Coast rohe there are intergenerational reviews of Te Tapuwae O Rongokako and Te Angiangi marine reserves, continued landscape scale restoration projects, conservation education, historic area preservation and enhancement, and endangered species protection.

The communities in the rohe need clear direction on managing the conservation estate, and the Board needs to have a way to monitor what gets managed! The board's objectives for the new year embrace all these matters.

During the last year we have had good attendance at our Public Forums. In some of these we have been able to enhance our own knowledge when hearing from experts on topics such as the endangered long-tailed bat, stream restoration, and water quality management.

The many highlights of being on the Board for me include meeting conservation leaders, getting closer to our special flora and fauna than most members of the public will ever do, and being strongly connected into the wonderful mahi that our Te Papa Atawhai people are doing. Alongside that privilege has been the responsibility of being a bridge between our community and the Department! There has always been so much to learn, and I've been very grateful for the support that DOC operations managers and directors have given me while in this role. There were several (!) but I do want to particularly acknowledge Chris Visser, John Lucas, Moana Dunlop, Jenny Nelson-Smith, Jack Mace, Reg Kemper, and of course, the amazing Sara Robinson our long-standing Board Support Officer!

The Board welcomed Doug Bailey in February, who joined Dr Lucy Meagher from Hawke's Bay. We saw two members resign in 2021, Sam Gibson in January and Wayne Taylor in April. Rena Kohere was co-opted onto the Board in February, whilst the process of nominations for the 2021/2022 year took place.

My thanks and acknowledgements to our deputy Chair, Apenti Tamanui-Fransen, for his leadership and knowledge in Te Ao Māori, his planning expertise, and his support at meetings. The connection into the NZCA remains vital for our functioning and it was good to have our new liaison person, Maxine Shortland zoom into our meetings over the last year. I know that I will also miss the keen and intelligent network of conservation board Chairs and leaders.

Finally, my sincere thanks to my fellow retiring Board colleague, Penny Shaw, who has served previously as Chair and as a Deputy Chairperson. Your friendship, leadership, enthusiasm for conservation, and your important networking in our Tairāwhiti tourism and conservation communities have been invaluable.

While I step away from this role I will remain connected into conservation and no doubt will see many of you again. I look forward to spending a bit more time helping my own small piece of Aotearoa becoming predator free!

2. Introduction

This is the seventh East Coast Hawkes Bay Conservation Board Annual Report. Section 6(O) of the Conservation Act requires conservation boards to provide the New Zealand Conservation Authority (the Authority) with an annual report as soon as practical after 30 June each year. In recognition of this requirement the East Coast Hawkes Bay Conservation Board submits this annual report.

Conservation boards are appointed by the Minister of Conservation under section 6(P) of the Conservation Act 1987. Board functions are outlined in section 6(M) and the powers, which enable the conservation boards to carry out those functions, are under 6(N) of the Act.

Conservation boards are independent advisory bodies, established by statute. They represent the community and offer interaction between communities and the Department of Conservation (the Department), within their area of jurisdiction.

Conservation boards have several statutory roles under various Acts including:

- advising the Department and the Authority on how conservation management strategies and plans will be put into practice
- the approval of conservation management plans
- the recommendation of national park management plans to the Authority for approval
- advising the Department and Authority on conservation matters, and proposed changes to status of land of national and international significance
- liaising with the regional Fish and Game Council on conservation matters
- carrying out other powers delegated by the Minister of Conservation, the Conservation Act or any other Act.

Conservation boards also have several functions under section 30 of the National Parks Act 1980. These functions include recommending the review or amendment of national park management plans and recommending approval of these plans by the Authority.

3. Conservation board region

East Coast/Hawke's Bay Te Tairāwhiti ki Te Matau-a-Maui Conservation Board

The East Coast/Hawke's Bay Conservation Board's area of jurisdiction covers the area of 3,268,295.98 hectares.


The jurisdiction extends from Te Araroa (north of Gisborne) to Mangaorapa (Central Hawke's Bay) on the East coast of the North Island. The area also extends out to the 12-nautical mile limit with respect to coastal and marine issues, and out to the 200-nautical mile limit with respect to protected species.

Approximately 1.37% of New Zealand's public conservation land and area lie within East Coast/Hawke's Bay's jurisdiction.

Public conservation land and areas make up 5.47% of all land in East Coast/Hawke's Bay. This consists of:

- 175,921.75 hectares of Public Conservation Land
- 2,916.6 hectares of Marine Reserves

4. Board functioning

4.1. Board functions under section 6m of the Conservation Act 1987

The functions of the Board are:

- To recommend the approval by the Authority of conservation management strategies, and the review and amendment of such strategies, under the relevant enactments
- 2) To approve conservation management plans, and the review an amendment of such plans, under the relevant enactments
- 3) To advise the Authority and the Director-General on the implementation of conservation management strategies and conservation management plans for the area within the jurisdiction of the Board
- 4) To advise the Authority or the Director-General
- 5) On any proposed change of status or classification of any area of national or international importance; and
- 6) On any other conservation matter relating to any area with the jurisdiction of the
- 7) To liaise with any Fish and Game Council on matter within the jurisdiction of the
- 8) To exercise such powers and functions as may be delegated to it by the Minister under this Act or any other Act.

4.2. Powers of the Board under section 6n of the Conservation Act 1987

- 1) Every conservation board shall have all such powers as are reasonably necessary or expedient to enable it to carry out its functions.
- 2) Without limiting the generality of subsection (1), each conservation board may
 - a) Advocate its interests at any public forum or in any statutory planning process; and
 - b) Appoint committees of members and other suitable persons, and delegate to them functions and powers.

3) The power conferred by subsection (2)(a) shall include the right to appear before courts and tribunals in New Zealand and be heard on matters affecting or relating to the Board's functions.

4.3. Board membership

There were 7 Board members for the reporting year appointed by the Minister of Conservation. Jo Blakeley was appointed Chairperson for a second year and Apenti Tamanui-Fransen appointed Deputy Chairperson.

6.2. Authority liaison

The Board believes that working with conservation organisations and members of the public is very important. Meetings were held in different parts of the East Coast/Hawkes Bay region and opportunities for the public to attend Board meetings were advertised.

6.4. Community visibility

The Board maintains a presence on the Department's website. Updates from the Board were provided throughout the year on activities undertaken.

The Board has a membership with Biodiversity Hawke's Bay. A permanent Board liaison role with BHB has been established. Board activities are shared on BHB's social media.

Members of the public attended the Public Forum at several of the year's meetings and a range of issues were raised. The Board appreciated their input and efforts made to attend the meetings and responded by letter with a response to questions asked or concerns raised.

Board members attended hui ahead of the opening of the 2020 whitebait season, hui about Te Angiangi Marine Reserve, and a tour of Cape Sanctuary and its nursery.

Public forum issues raised during 2020/2021

- Te Angiangi Marine Reserve Pōrangahau locals and hapū have varied opinions as how to best manage the marine reserve as it approaches its first generational review in 2023.
- Lois Easton of Kererū Consultants gave a presentation of the work achieved to date at Waikereru Ecosanctuary / Longbush before outlining the Waimata River Restoration Project.
- Rob McLean updated the Board on the conservation work done in McLean's Bush Scenic Reserve
- Volunteer work was also commended when hearing from Soraya Pohatu with her Rongowhakaata Taiao team helping to restore Rongawhakaata ngahere at both Rakaukaka Scenic Reserve and Te Wherowhero lagoon

These were predominantly voluntary groups carrying out huge amounts of conservation work within the community. The Board recognises and appreciates volunteers and thanks them for the work done in this area.

6.5. District and regional council advocacy and advice

The Board appreciates the opportunities to meet with representatives of the six local Councils as there are several regional issues in which it is interested. Doug Bailey and Jo Blakeley met with HBRC managers to discuss mutual interests.

Work Programme 1 July 2020 – 30 June 2021

Work Programme overview

This Work Programme responds to the Letter of Expectation from the Minister of Conservation dated 7 September 2020. The intention is that this document will be reviewed and updated at Board meetings during the year, as a living document. It comprises three parts, some of which contain overlapping objectives:

Part A: Planned Board activities aimed at meeting the Board's strategic priorities and its core statutory functions:

- 1. Develop strong Treaty Partner relationships
- 2. Ensure there is better biodiversity protection in a changing climate
- 3. Review, develop and monitor statutory management plans including Conservation Management Strategies (CMS)
- 4. Provide advice relating to stewardship land and classification
- 5. Fulfil the Board's other statutory functions
- 6. Provide advocacy on strategic conservation mahi in the region

Part B: The Minister's fundamental priorities as set out in the Letter of Expectation:

- Ensure any review of a national park management plan or conservation management strategy occurring in the Board area is progressed and effectively and promotes strong conservation outcomes.
- 2. Work with Te Papa Atawhai and manawhenua on developing and improving the implementation of Treaty of Waitangi partnerships and the requirements of section 4 of the Conservation Act.
- 3. Advise the Department on strengthening its climate mitigation and adaption initiatives.
- 4. Implement Te mana o te Taiao, the Aotearoa New Zealand Biodiversity Strategy when it is released, working with iwi and hapū, community organisations, councils, and the department.
- 5. Advocate for conservation and engage and connect with manawhenua and their local communities on local conservation issues.

Part C: Planned Board activities aimed at general expectations contained in the Minister's Letter:

- 1. Take account of DOC priorities (contained in its Four-year Plan)
- 2. Increase engagement with the community, including raising the profile of the Board to achieve the Board's objectives
- 3. Align the Board's conservation leadership role with DOC by maintaining a strong working relationship with DOC and providing strategic advice
