

#### Chairperson's Report

Management Plans

Another busy year for the Tongariro/Taupo Conservation Board has seen the completion of the Tongariro National Park Management Plan. The subcommittee chaired by Warwick Silvester has put a great effort in getting to the final stages. They have had to seek legal advice from the department's chief legal adviser Jonty Somers, an addition to the work load. To complete the plan another meeting with Ngati Tuwharetoa Maori Trust Board and the Ketetahi Trust took place to discuss the advice received from the legal advisor. When this is completed and an agreement reached, we will be able to finish the plan.

In September the Board began their review of the Kaimanawa Forest Park Management Plan the sub-committee for this is chaired by Les Molloy. It is envisaged that we will have the plan in the public arena by October 2005. All things going well it should be completed by March 2006.

Crater Lake

Mount Ruapehu lake crater has been to the fore again. The subcommittee chaired by Murray McKee has kept a watchful eye on lake levels along with the department's scientist, Dr Harry Keys. A presentation by Jarrad Bowler, from Genesis, on their hazards and warning systems was held at our December 2004 and we also discussed any issues concerning the departments own warning systems. Our partners Ngati Tuwharetoa and Ngati Rangi are kept informed of the situation at regular intervals. Their stance is still no interference at the lake crater. The Board still stands firm in its view of not intervening at the lake itself as well.

Lake Taupo Water Quality and Related Matters

The Board again this year has taken a special interest in the Lake Taupo water quality and increasing urban development in Taupo resulting in pressures on public conservation land. The Statutory Planning subcommittee, lead by Brian Robinson, has made several submissions on matters related to Lake Taupo water quality and urban development. Firstly to Environment Waikato, on the proposed Regional Plan, Variation 5, on limiting nitrogen entry to the lake. Secondly to the Taupo District Council plan, Variation 8, and Taupo West Rural Structure Plan. The subcommittee have also attended several hearings.

The Blue-Duck Programme

This project is now underway. The project is to secure a combined minimum population of forty inter-relating pairs in the central North Island. To achieve this we will have to control predators like stoats. Nic Etheridge (Technical Support Officer) reported to the Board on the response of Blue Duck populations to predators and predator control. Thanks to the support of local iwi and the Sir Edmund Hilary Outdoor Pursuit Centre.

Special thanks to Bub Smith for his efforts in this programme.

The Old Coach Road and The Historic Hapuawhenua Viaduct

Following strong submissions to the Tongariro National Park Management plan hearings the Ohakune Coach Road and the Hapuahwhenua viaduct have been included as managed resources in the new management plan. The Board has taken a particular interest in this including a site visit in

2003. The development of these resources is the subject of a joint Department of Conservation and local community initiative. This has developed to where the people of Ohakune are progressing to organise funding and working groups to proceed with the clearing of the cobble stones. This initiative will be followed with interest by the Board.

World Heritage

In October 2004, at the Grand Chateau, the World Heritage Committee met with the express purpose of producing a five year strategic plan, for the World Heritage in the Pacific. This was chaired by Tumu te Heuheu and the powhiri was held at Whakapapa Visitor Centre. There were sixty people in attendance from all over the South Pacific. Department of Conservation and Conservation Board members also took part.

#### Conservation Awards

In December many Board members were present at the Tongariro/Taupo Conservancy's Conservation awards. This was well supported by the community and the Schools throughout the district.

I would like to thank the Tongariro/Taupo Conservancy staff for their assistants and co-operation during the past year. Particular mention to Paul Green, Sean Goddard, Dave Lumley, Mark Davies, Rowena Cudby and Jodine Hood must be made. John Nankervis has been reappointed to the New Zealand Conservation Authority, congratulations to John, he has kept the Board up to date during the year. Last but not least I would like to thank all my Board members for all their hard work and achievements. To those members that have retired, Bettine Davies, Murrary McKee and Lynette Brown much appreciation for your services to this Board, I wish them well for the future and for any new endeavours that they may pursue.

## 2 Functions and Powers of the Board

The Tongariro/Taupo Conservation Board is an independent advisory body appointed by the Minister of Conservation under section 6P of the Conservation Act 1987. The Board is responsible, under this Act, for shaping conservation management through the development of a conservation management strategy (CMS) and conservation management plans (CMPs) for land administered by the Department of Conservation in Tongariro/Taupo Conservancy. The Tongariro National Park is administered under the National Parks Act 1980 under which the Board also has functions. The Tongariro National Park Management Plan is developed under that Act. The Board provides advice on policy to the Department, acts as a liaison body between the Crown and the public, and advocates for conservation values on land not administered by the Department.

#### 3 Introduction to the Board District

The Tongariro/Taupo Conservancy covers 780,000 hectares, of which approximately 217,000 hectares are administered by the Department of Conservation. The conservancy is unique in that it has no sea coastline and includes the Lake Taupo sport fishery.

The Conservancy is dominated by the volcanic landscape of Tongariro National Park, the beech forest and tussock ranges of Kaimanawa Forest Park and by New Zealand's largest lake, Lake Taupo. Tongariro, Erua and Rangataua conservation areas to the east and south of the national park play a valuable part in terms of their ecological features and recreational opportunities.

Tangata whenua – Ngati Tuwharetoa, Ngati Hikairo, Ngati Rangi and Ngati Tahu Iwi – have long had a special relationship and history with the mountains, lakes, waterways and geothermal features of this area. Tongariro, New Zealand's first national park, grew from the Ngati Tuwharetoa gift of its mountains to the nation in 1887. The park received World Heritage status in 1988 for natural landscape values and in 1993 for its cultural landscape values, recognising the special significance of the mountains to Tuwharetoa and Wanganui iwi.

The Conservancy contains many rare, uncommon, vulnerable or threatened native plants, birds, communities and ecosystems. Managing these in light of weeds, predators, fires and

other threats remains a challenge.

The landscape of the area is unique in New Zealand and large numbers of national and international visitors come here for sightseeing and recreation. Tongariro National Park is the most visited national park in New Zealand and numbers are expected to rise further. In contrast, the surrounding mountain ranges retain a feeling of remoteness and isolation which is

increasingly sought by recreationists - New Zealanders especially.



## 5 Board Functions under Section 6M of the Conservation Act 1987<sup>1</sup>

#### 5.1 CONSERVATION MANAGEMENT STRATEGIES - SECTION 6M(1)(A)

The Tongariro/Taupo Conservation Management Strategy was approved in May 2002 and has a lifetime of ten years.

#### 5.2 Conservation Management Plans - Section 6M(1)(B)

The Board and the department have worked on the Tongariro National Park Management Plan review process during 2004/2005.

The Kaimanawa Forest Park Management Plan review is underway and a discussion document was provided to the Board in August 2004. Many Board members attended a round of public consultation meetings during September and October on the discussion document. Board members each received a full copy of public submissions to the discussion document. The draft Kaimanawa Forest Park Management Plan is due out in July 2005 with a combined board/staff workshop on the draft planned for 29 July 2005.

#### 5.3 IMPLEMENTATION OF CMS - SECTION 6M(1)(C)

The Board has initiated the process of CMS monitoring reporting which was established in early 2004. The Board was briefed on seven of the 18 sections of the CMS. The sections covered were:

- Additions to and Classification of Conservation Land
- Natural Hazards (Including Fire) and Earth Resources Protection
- Control of Animal Pests
- Taupo Basin
- Protected Species Fauna
- Protected Species Flora
- Recreational Use Management (Excluding Skiing)

The way the Board responds to and liaises with the Department of Conservation continues to evolve as the Board becomes more familiar with the process.

5.4 ADVICE TO THE NEW ZEALAND CONSERVATION AUTHORITY AND DIRECTOR-GENERAL OF CONSERVATION ON CHANGES TO LAND STATUS – SECTION 6M(1)(D)

There has been no progress on the addition of Rangataua Forest to the Tongariro National Park or the gazettal of Tongariro Forest as a conservation park. These areas are currently subject to a Treaty of Waitangi claim.

The gazettal of the proposed scenic reserves Huka Falls, Alum Lakes and Craters of the moon are still on hold due to outstanding Treaty issues and the settlement of the Crown's obligations to Contact Energy Limited.

5.5 ADVICE TO THE NZ CONSERVATION AUTHORITY OR THE DIRECTOR-GENERAL ON ANY OTHER CONSERVATION MATTERS – SECTION 6M(1)(D)(II)

The Board made submission on the National Parks draft policy mountain bike statements.

5.6 ADVICE TO THE NZ CONSERVATION AUTHORITY AND DIRECTOR-GENERAL ON PROPOSALS FOR NEW WALKWAYS – SECTION 6M(1)(E)

The Board continues to be interested in the possibility of a walking track around Lake Taupo. A proposal by Bike Taupo, a community group, concerning the establishment of a multi-user track from Whakaipo Bay to Kinloch is still being undertaken.

5.7 LIAISON WITH FISH AND GAME COUNCILS – SECTION 6M(1)(F)

A Eastern Fish and Game Council representative continues to be informed of the Board's work through agenda papers and minutes.


